- 27 Non CLI students may elect these courses on a space available basis during the add/drop period. In case of over-enrollment, preference will be given to CLI students.
- 28 Enrollment in this course is limited to students who have satisfactorily completed a minimum of six credits of CCLS: General Practice Clinic. Registration in this course requires prior approval of Professors Mullen, Brustin and Scully.
- 29 Enrollment in this course is limited to students who have satisfactorily completed a minimum of six credits of CCLS: Families & the Law Clinic. Registration in this course requires prior approval of Professors Barry and Klein.
- 30 Final grade will be based on a paper; it does not satisfy the upper-level writing requirement.
- 31 Please see the Clinical Programs Office (Room 312) for details regarding application deadlines. Meets at S.E.C.
- 32 Limited to CLI Students.
- 33 To participate in this course, students must either be supervised by a member of the full-time faculty or have completed Becoming a Lawyer, Becoming a Communications Lawyer, Becoming a Securities Lawyer or Becoming a Public Policy Lawyer.
- 34 Required of all LPP certificate students graduating in May 2006.

Spring 2012 Upper Divisions Courses

- 35 Students seeking to enroll in this course must have taken, or take simultaneously, Evidence and Professional Responsibility; limited to 12 students.
- 36 Students must complete this course in order to graduate.
- 37 Open to all upper-class students; limited to 30 students; in case of over-enrollment, CLI students will have priority.
- 38 Preference will be given to evening division students.
- 39 Limited to an aggregate total of 15 students in Law 907, 913 and 921. Participants must be eligible for certification under the Student Practice Rule of the District of Columbia, which requires completion of a minimum of 41 credit hours including Civil Procedure, Criminal Law, Criminal Procedure: The Investigative Process, and Evidence. Required pre-registration interview with LSIC staff. Meets at LSIC offices.
- 40 Participants who have completed Evidence, Civil Procedure, Criminal Law, and Criminal Procedure: The Investigative Process and a minimum of 41 credit hours may be certified under the Student Practice Rule of the District of Columbia to represent clients in court. Upper-class students who do not meet the certification requirements also can take course.
- 41 Students enrolled are expected to spend a minimum of 20 hours weekly on clinic work, including instructional time.
- 42 Each section of the seminar portion of the course is limited to 16 students.
- 43 It is recommended that students who have previously taken Agency may not want to enroll in the UBO course, as these two courses contain overlapping material. However, a student is not precluded from taking both courses.
- 44 This course is graded on a Pass/Fail basis.
- 45 This course must be taken contemporaneously with a Supervised Fieldwork for 2 (Law 924) or 3 credits (Law 926).
- 46 Prerequisites: Evidence, Trial Advocacy or Trial Practice or Trial Skills, and Criminal Procedure: The Investigative Process. Participants must be eligible for certification under the Maryland Student Practice Rule.
- 47 This course is limited to LPP certificate students; other upper-class students may enroll on a space available basis during the add/drop period.
- 48 Students may opt to take this course for a letter grade or pass/fail. The selection of an option must be made by the end of the add/drop period, in the Office of Academic Affairs, Room 343; failure to exercise an option by the deadline will result in default to a letter grade.
- 49 Evening students may enroll on a space-available basis. See the appropriate instructor(s) for approval.
- 50 Consent required from the Clinical Coordinator.
- 51 Students are selected for this course by Professor Barracato. Interested students are asked to pre-register for this class at Clinics Day. Professor Barracato will then review the list of applicants and select students for the course. Students must submit a current resume and a cover letter expressing their interest in litigation. For further information, please see Professor Barracato.
- 52 Reserved. Reference Spring schedule footnote #52.

Spring 2012 Upper Divisions Courses

- 53 This course may satisfy one of the two upper-level writing requirements; however, a student may not count both this course and the Law Journal Writing course toward the fulfillment of the two upper-level writing requirements.
- 54 This course may satisfy one of the two upper-level writing requirements; however, a student may not count both this course and the Law Journal Editing course toward the fulfillment of the two upper-level writing requirements.
- 55 Successful completion of this course may satisfy one of the two upper-level writing requirements.
- 56 Limited to five students. The class meets at the Department of Justice. Students who are registered in the course must contact Stewart Robinson at (202) 616-6690 before the first class meeting.
- 57 Limited to 16 students: 8 in Montgomery County and 8 in Prince George's County. Selected students will be asked their county of preference, but in case of over-selection they will be assigned randomly to a county. The class will meet in the offices of the State's attorney for the assigned county.
- 58 Directed Research may satisfy one of the two upper-level writing requirements. It is a two-credit course that may be completed in one or two semesters, at the option of the instructor.
- 59 Students may elect to write a qualifying course paper or three products required for the Applied Legal Writing Portfolio option of the upper-level writing requirement or take an exam.
- 60 Prerequisites: Evidence and Trial Practice or Trial Skills.
- 61 Participants must have successfully completed Evidence, Civil Procedure, Criminal Law, and Criminal Procedure: The Investigative Process, a minimum of 41 credit hours, and otherwise be eligible to be certified under the Student Practice Rule of the District of Columbia.
- 62 Prerequisite: Constitutional Law.
- 63 Limited to students having completed LSIC: Civil 914 (6 Cr) in Summer 2008.
- 64 This course is open to all upper-level students in the appropriate division. Students must complete this course prior to graduation.
- 65 This course can be taken only in conjunction with Becoming a Public Policy Lawyer Seminar (Law 431) or Public Policy Practicum (Law 575).
- 66 This course is mandatory for third and fourth year law journal members who supervise student Writing Projects (as determined by the Editor-in-Chief); it is optional for other third and fourth year journal members. In order to receive the credits allocated to this course, students must register in the Fall Semester. If a student has not completed the required editing assignments by the end of the Fall Semester, work may continue into the Spring, and therefore, course credits will not be awarded until the end of the Spring Semester.
- 67 Limited to 10 students.
- 68 Students who enroll in the Families and the Law Clinic should keep their Thursdays clear for the scheduling of court hearings and other FALC activities.
- 69 LL.M. students will be given priority in case of over-enrollment.

Spring 2012 Upper Divisions Courses

- 70 Students who have completed one of the Becoming a Lawyer classes in a previous semester may register for Supervised Fieldwork to obtain credit for another externship. Students in Supervised Fieldwork will receive tutorial supervision from an instructor. Each student must contact the instructor during the first week of the semester to schedule an initial tutorial appointment.
- 71 This course is required for students who are in the Law and Public Policy Program. Day students must take this class during their third year. Evening students may take the class during their third or fourth year. Students taking the Public Policy Practicum must also register for a Legal externship for three credits or for one of the live-client clinical courses (Families and the Law, General Practice, Elder Law, Innocence Project, or Law Students in Court) during the Fall semester.
- 72 Limited to 9 students with instructor approval.
- 73 Course will be offered upon final approval of Faculty.
- 74 This course was previously offered as a one-credit pass/fail seminar. However, a proposal to offer the course as a two-credit graded seminar was approved by the faculty. All students who enroll in this course should also enroll in Legal Externship to obtain two or three credits for fieldwork. Students who are enrolling in their first externships must enroll in one of the Becoming a Lawyer seminars during the same semester as the fieldwork.
- 75 Students enrolling in their first externships should register for the fieldwork credits by signing up for Legal Externship and must also enroll in one of the Becoming a Lawyer seminars. Students taking the Public Policy Practicum who are doing externships should also register for their fieldwork credit through Legal Externship.
- 76 This course fulfills the Professional Skills requirement.
- 77 Students are permitted to elect to enroll on either a graded or pass/fail basis. This election must be made upon initial enrollment in the course.
- 78 For information about registering for LSIC, call 202-638-1351.
- 79 Students have the option to take this course on a pass/fail basis. To select this option, please contact Professor Lerman, Coordinator of Clinical Programs.
- 80 This is a year-long course. Students must enroll for 3 credits each semester to earn credit for the course.
- 81 This is an exam course; it does not satisfy the upper-level writing requirement.
- 82 Enrollment in this one credit, pass/fail course is limited to students in the Comparative and International Law Certificate Program. All students who enroll in this course should also enroll in Legal Externship to obtain two or three credits for fieldwork.
- 83 Enrollment in this one credit, pass/fail course is limited to students in the Securities Law Certificate Program. All students who enroll in this course should also enroll in Legal Externship to obtain two or three credits for fieldwork.
- 84 This course can fulfill either one of the two upper division writing requirements or the Professional Skills requirement, but may not be used to satisfy both. The elimination of this "double counting" begins with the Fall 2008 incoming class. All

other students are urged to take two writing courses independent of the Professional Skills requirement.

- 85 This course will meet 5 times over the course of the Spring 2012 semester (January 14, 28, February 11, 25, March 3)
- 86 The faculty member of this course has the option of offering this course on a pass/fail or graded basis.
- 87 The Professor intends to ban or at least limit the use of laptops in this class. Laptops will be permitted for taking examinations, but the professor may limit or ban their use during class discussion. Please take this into account when considering whether to register for this course.
- 88 Pre-registration is required for this course. Please contact the clinic coordinator for further details.
- 89 Students taking this course may not also take for credit the Spring "Strategies for the Bar Exam" course
- 90 Regardless of the add/drop date, students must attend the first session of this class in order to remain enrolled in this course.
- 91 Students in this course have the option of taking an exam or writing a qualifying course paper.
- 92 Limited to an aggregate total of 8 students in all sections of CCLS: Consumer Protection Project
- 93 This course may be taken for 2 or 3 credits. There is a 2 credit seminar and any students electing to take the 3 credit option will spend the additional 1 credit hour developing a paper related to the course topic within a professor guided tutorial setting. Staff members of the Journal of Law, Philosophy and Culture seeking journal writing credit should enroll in the 3 credit option.
- 94 A student may take only one section/class of Legal Drafting over the course of his or her law school career, despite the fact that there are multiple sections of Legal Drafting with varying concentrations.
- 95 This course is restricted to 3D, 3E and 4E students and subject to approval by the professor. Class limited to 10 students.
