* Students in the Cracow program are limited to a maximum total of 8 credits for the Summer term. Registration is handled by the Registrar. The add/drop deadline for the Law of the European Union, Comparative & International Trade and International Economic Regulation courses is June 20, 2012. The add/drop deadline for the International Business Transactions and International Human Rights courses is July 12, 2012.

1. Writing Course (WC). Successful completion of this course will satisfy one of the two upper-level writing requirements.
 2. Paper/exam option. At the discretion of the instructor, this course may include a qualifying course paper that fulfills one half of the upper level writing requirement.
 3. Advocacy for the Elderly is a 12-week program. Interested students must fill out a separate application in the CCLS office prior to or at the time of registration. Evening students have priority in this course and visitors may enroll only with the approval of the faculty supervisor.
 4. Becoming a Lawyer is a prerequisite for the Legal Externship: Supervised Fieldwork course. If this is your first externship at the Law School, you must sign up for both Becoming a Lawyer and Legal Externship. If you have already completed an externship at the Law School (and thus have already taken Becoming a Lawyer), you should only register for Legal Externship: Supervised Fieldwork. All externships must be completed by July 30, 2012. Visiting students are allowed to enroll in the externship classes only with the permission of the Academic Dean of the student's own Law School, our Assistant Dean for Academic Affairs and our Director of Clinical Programs.
 5. Student/advising faculty must submit Directed Research form by May 21, 2012. Registrar will then register student.
 6. Limited to 16 students.
 7. Qualifying course paper.
 8. This course is open to rising second and third year students. Rising second-year evening students who take this course during the summer need not register for this course in the fall.

9. This course meets the Professional Skills requirement. However, if you are counting this class towards your upper-level writing requirement, you cannot also fulfill the Professional Skills requirement with this course.
10. This course is graded on a pass/fail basis.
11. This course will allow students the option of completing a supervised written paper (qualifying course paper) or taking an exam.
12. This class is held for a total of five days and is limited to 15 students. This class will meet on May 22, 23, 24, 29 & 30. The 6 hours of daily scheduled class time includes a 1 hour break. The last day to add/drop this class will be **May 21, 2012**. To drop this course, receive a refund and not receive a withdrawal ('W'), you must drop by **May 21, 2012**. This is a simulation class (no exam/paper). It will focus on Mediation Skills. This class will **NOT** qualify towards meeting the writing requirement. It **WILL** qualify towards meeting the Professional Skills requirement. This is an introductory mediation skill development course. Mediation is one of the alternative dispute resolution conflict management mechanisms. The course will be approached from the perspective of educating the novice dispute resolver as to what mediation is, how it is different from other forms of dispute resolution, what skills are necessary to manage the mediation process and how to utilize the appropriate skills and dispute resolution tools to resolve a dispute. The classes will include lectures, demonstrations (video-taped and/or live), discussions, and simulations. The overall objective of the course is to give students a general understanding of mediation (from the perspective of the mediator, a party and an advocate), the basic skills necessary to manage the mediation process and a general familiarity with other dispute resolution processes.
13. Students in the five-day Mediation Skills course are prohibited from registering for a second summer course other than Directed Research.
14. This course will require the completion of an applied legal writing portfolio. This portfolio fulfills one-half of the upper-level writing requirement (including the "practice-oriented" legal writing requirement).
15. The Patent Law course is a pre-requisite for Patent Prosecution. For students who have not taken Patent Law but who have relevant patent experience, please contact the Registrar, Stuart Schept (schept@law.edu), for contact information for Professors Blinka and Weiss McLeod. Professors Blinka and Weiss McLeod will use their discretion in giving permission for the class to students who do not have the Patent Law pre-requisite.
16. This course provides students the opportunity to develop knowledge and skills related to the preparation and prosecution of patent applications before the U.S. Patent & Trademark Office. Students will develop efficient patent and claim drafting techniques, and will learn effective prosecution strategies, such as analyzing and responding to office actions and avoiding prosecution history estoppel.
