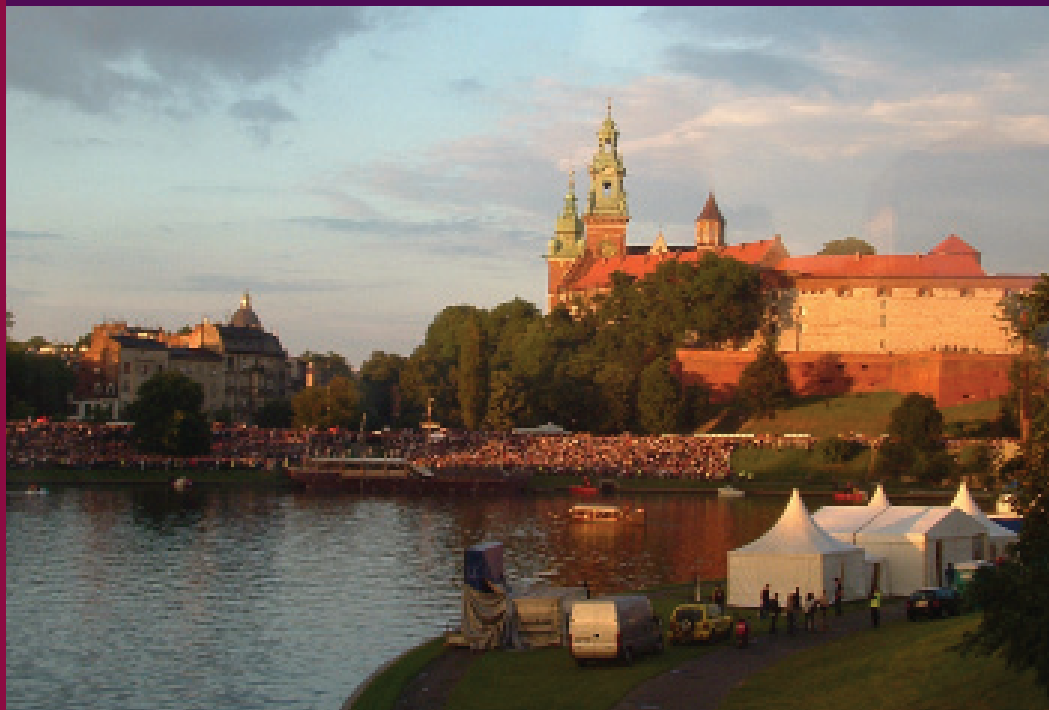

DAY TRIPS AND ADDITIONAL ACTIVITIES

Several excursions are planned to introduce all participants to the culture and history of Poland and may include:

- Tour of historic Cracow and Wawel Castle and Cathedral
- Riverboat tour on the Dunajec River
- Tour of the geological wonders of the Wieliczka Salt Mine
- Visit to the former concentration camp at Oswiecim (Auschwitz)
- Trip to Zakopane, a popular mountain resort at the foot of the Tatra Mountains
- Alumni bonfire and cookout
- Visit to a law firm

APPLICATION PROCESS

The program is open to U.S., Canadian and European law students who are currently enrolled at an accredited law school, are in good standing with their law school, and who will have completed one year of academic work prior to June 1, 2012. Applicants should determine in advance the home institution's policy regarding the transfer of credits.

Graduates of accredited law schools may be eligible to participate in the program but will not earn academic credit.

Polish students: Requirements regarding deposits and tuition do not apply. However the Polish students may be charged a fee contributing to the administrative expenses of the program. Please direct inquiries to Prof. dr Michal Chorosnicki at chormich48@yahoo.com.

U.S. and Canadian applicants only: Please refer to the dates below for program deadlines. Students are encouraged to apply early as the program fills quickly.

February 18

■ For best consideration, please submit your application by February 18th along with payment of the \$100 non-refundable application fee.

March 11

■ \$500 deposit due to be credited toward the final bill for all students accepted to the program. This deposit secures your space in the program.

■ Letter from the applicant's law school's academic dean stating that the student will have completed one year of academic work prior to June 1, 2012, is in good standing, and has permission to enroll in the 2012 International Business and Trade Summer Law Program in Cracow. Also please indicate any disabilities for which the student receives special accommodations.

FINANCIAL AID

The summer program is not in a position to provide direct financial assistance to program students; however, the CUA law school Office of Financial Aid will process loans or other benefits to which students might be entitled. Questions concerning financial aid should be directed to the Office of Financial Aid at 202-319-5143. Those students attending from other institutions are encouraged to work directly with their home institutions using consortium agreements regarding their financial aid opportunities. Loan assistance can usually be obtained for the full cost of the program, including living expenses and transportation.
