Gregory Khalil is a Palestinian-American attorney and former legal advisor with the Negotiations Support Unit (NSU), Palestinian Authority, from 2004 to 2008. The NSU is an international organization based in Ramallah, the West Bank, that provides legal, policy, and communications support on peace negotiations with Israel. During his tenure at the NSU, Mr. Khalil worked on a variety of issues including Israel's construction of a barrier in the West Bank and Israel's withdrawal of settlers from the Gaza Strip. He was also an official member of the Palestinian delegation to the Annapolis Conference in November, 2007. Mr. Khalil is a graduate of UCLA and Yale Law School.

Paul L. Scham is a Professor at the University of Maryland at College Park and Executive Director of its Gildenhorn Institute for Israel Studies, as well as an Adjunct Scholar at the Middle East Institute in Washington, D.C. His primary interest is in the history and current politics of Israel and of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. He has worked for the last few years on the historical narratives of the two sides, co-editing one book (with another to be published in 2009) and publishing a number of articles. Currently, he is researching development and evolution of Hamas and investigating how Israel and the West can cope with it, as well as closely following Middle East events.

Marshall J. Breger is a professor of law at the Columbus School of Law, The Catholic University of America. From 1993-95, he was a senior fellow at the Heritage Foundation, Washington, D.C. During the Bush Administration he served as Solicitor of Labor, the chief lawyer of the Labor Department with a staff of over 800. During 1992 by presidential designation he served concurrently as Acting Assistant Secretary for Labor Management Standards. From 1985-91 Breger was chairman of the Administrative Conference of the United States, an independent federal agency. During 1987-89 he also served as alternate delegate of the U.S. to the U.N. Human Rights Commission in Geneva. From 1982-84 he served as special assistant to President Reagan and his liaison to the Jewish Community. In Fall 2002, Breger was Lady Davis Visiting Professor of Law at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. In Fall 2003 he was Distinguished Sy-Cip Fulbright Lecturer in the Philippines.
