Under supervision, law students help conduct intakes, conduct research, and draft motions.

The Washington Lawyers' Committee holds a regular Workers' Rights Clinic where low-income workers with employment law problems can have a one-on-one consultation. Under supervision, law student intake volunteers interview workers about their workplace issues and work with experienced employment attorneys to relay advice to workers.
