- 1 Limited enrollment course.
- 2 This course fulfills the Transition to Practice graduation requirement.
- 3 This course is limited to 3rd year or 4th year students.
- 4 Reserved.
- 5 Year-long course; must be taken for two semesters in order to receive credit.
- 6 Prerequisites are listed in the [Announcements](#).
- 7 All second and third year part-time students are required to take this course this Fall semester.
- 8 All second year part-time students are required to take this course this Fall semester.
- 9 Students may choose this course for 2 or 3 credits. Students choosing 3 credits will write a qualifying course paper in addition to taking the exam. Students choosing the 2 credit option will take the exam and complete shorter writing assignments (shorter than the qualifying course paper).
- 10 Reserved.
- 11 Reserved.
- 12 Exam/paper option, at option of student. Qualifying course paper.
- 13 Qualifying course paper.
- 14 Topic application for Directed Research must be submitted to the Academic Dean's office, Room 343, no later than the last day of the add/drop period.
- 15 Students seeking to participate in more than one clinical program per semester must have the permission of the Director of Experiential Education. Some of these clinical offerings are only possible for students who can participate during the day.

- 16 Open only to selected students.
- 17 Open only to selected students. A pre-application is required. For more information, please contact the following individuals: for the CCLS clinics - Prof. Chris Ross; for the criminal law clinics - Dean Bryan McDermott.
- 18 Some writing in this course may be used to satisfy one or more of the three products required for the Applied Legal Writing Portfolio option of the upper-level writing requirement.
- 19 Students who have taken the Foreign Relations and National Security course cannot also take this course, or vice versa.
- 20 Reserved.
- 21 Reserved.
- 22 Reserved.
- 23 Reserved.
- 24 This course will meet every other week for the duration of the Fall semester.
- 25 Preference will be given to evening division students.
- 26 Participants may be certified to represent clients in court under the Student Practice Rule of the District of Columbia. Please see your clinic professor for details. Upper-class students who do not meet the certification requirements can still take the course.
- 27 Enrolled students are expected to spend a minimum of 20 hours weekly on clinic work, including instructional time.
- 28 This course will meet for only the second half of the semester.
- 29 This course will meet for only the first half of the semester.
- 30 This course is graded on a pass/fail basis.
- 31 Participants must be eligible for certification under the Maryland Student Practice rule. Please see the Experiential Learning director for details.
- 32 With faculty permission, students may opt to take this course pass/fail. The selection of this option must be made by the end of the add/drop period. Please e-mail the Registrar to select this option; failure to exercise an option by the deadline will result in default to a letter grade.
- 33 Evening students may enroll on a space available basis. Please see the appropriate instructor(s) for approval.
- 34 This course may satisfy one of the two upper-level writing requirements; however, a student may not count both this course and the Law Journal Writing course toward the fulfillment of the two upper-level writing requirements.
- 35 This course may satisfy one of the two upper-level writing requirements; however, a student may not count both this course and the Law Journal Editing course toward the fulfillment of the two upper-level writing requirements.

- 36 This course may satisfy one of the two upper-level writing requirements.
- 37 Reserved.
- 38 Directed Research may satisfy one of the two upper-level writing requirements. It is a two-credit course that may be completed in one or two semesters, at the option of the instructor.
- 39 Prerequisites: Constitutional Law: Structure, Separation of Powers, Federalism and Constitutional Law: Individual Rights and Liberties.
- 40 Reserved.
- 41 This course is required for students who are in the Law and Public Policy Program. Day students must take this class during their third year. Evening students may take the class during their third or fourth year.
- 42 This course is offered as a one-credit, pass/fail seminar. All students who enroll in this course must also enroll in Legal Externship to obtain two or three credits for fieldwork. Students who are enrolling in their first externship for credit must enroll in one of the Becoming a Lawyer seminars during the same semester as the fieldwork.
- 43 Students enrolling in their first externship should register for 2 or 3 credits of Legal Externship and must also enroll in one of the Becoming a Lawyer seminars. Students in their second or greater externship should only register for 2 or 3 credits of Legal Externship. "Second or greater" students will have periodic written reflection assignments and may meet with Prof. Ross during the course of the semester. In order to register for Legal Externship credits, students must complete an application through careers.law.edu. Please see the Legal Externship website for details. Once your externship is approved, you will be given permission within Cardinal Students to register for the 2 or 3 credit Legal Externship, and must submit a Learning Agreement signed by your supervisor before the end of the add/drop period.
- 44 This course fulfills a portion of the Experiential Learning Requirement.
- 45 Clinic classes will mainly meet on Tuesday and Thursday for the first half of the semester.
- 46 This course can fulfill one of the two upper-division writing requirements and a portion of the Experiential Learning Req.
- 47 Registration for this course is open to full-time students beginning at 9:00 a.m. on Wednesday, April 30th. Part-time students may begin registering for this course at the opening of Fall 2025 registration on either April 23rd (rising 4E students) or April 25th (rising 2E and 3E students).
- 48 Students in this course have the option of writing a qualifying course paper to fulfill one-half of the upper-level writing requirement, write two shorter papers which will not fulfill any portion of the upper-level writing requirement, or take an exam.
- 49 Required of all second year, full-time students.
- 50 Please see course description for further details regarding this optional additional credit.
- 51 Students in this course have the option of writing a qualifying course paper to fulfill one-half of the upper-level writing requirement or write shorter papers which will not fulfill any portion of the upper-level writing requirement.
- 52 Prerequisite: Criminal Procedure: The Investigative Process. Recommended for students to have completed, or take concurrently, the

Criminal Procedure: Post Investigative Process course.

- 53 This course will meet remotely/online for a few sessions over the course of the semester. Students will be notified a week in advance of a remote session.
- 54 This course requires students to dedicate time working on client issues beyond the class session meetings noted on the schedule.
- 55 On certain weeks, the Thursday (8:00-8:55 a.m.) remote class meeting will be substituted by a Friday remote meeting from 8:00-9:15 a.m.
- 56 Reserved.
- 57 This hybrid course will have five in-person (on campus) Tuesday class meetings and nine remote Tuesday class meetings via Zoom. All Thursday class meetings will be remote via Zoom.
- 58 This is a hybrid in-class, on-line course. It will meet in class for 70 minutes per week on Mondays. The remainder of the instructional time will occur through an on-line platform.
- 59 Reserved
- 60 This course is contingent on enrollment of at least eight students.
